



Hi Zone 4 Friends and Family,




Parade Planning is in full swing, and I look forward to seeing many of you in French Lick in July. Check out the website for all the details at porscheparade.org.





Ask the MASTER CYLINDER

He's Chris Braden, head of **Munks Motors** in Waterford. These questions are real, and Chris, whose knowledge of Porsches is encyclopedic, takes them on.*

Q – I feel lousy. I love my car but it just dumped on me. I took it in for an oil change and my mechanic mentioned that my clutch pedal felt rough when pressing it down or letting it up. I wasn't really concerned about it since the clutch was replaced about a year and a half ago. I mentioned that and he suggested I take it back to the place that replaced it and get their opinion.

So I did, and they agreed that it was a problem. So far so good. I authorized them to take it apart again to see what had gone wrong.

I am not hard on a clutch and it still felt very strong, it just had this odd sensation in the pedal. They took it apart and said that other parts in the system had failed and that when they did the work originally, they were OK. So I said "go ahead and replace them but I want to speak to the service manager about the issue." Well they fixed it and presented me with a bill for \$2,500. That is almost what it cost to have the work done the last time. I am very upset and I hope you can explain it to me from a mechanic's perspective. —Chuck

A -There are many ways to approach a problem and deal with it. If one were to do only what is asked and nothing more, disappointments down the road inevitable. When I was young my dad, who was an engineer, stressed the wisdom of spending a little more time to think a problem through and find the right solution. His philosophy was "if you can improve the design for lifespan, performance or cost, you could make an informed choice about how you want to do it." So, when one is given only one choice, not the range of possibilities, details can get overlooked with devastating consequences.

I was young when my dad started hammering this concept into my brain, so I usually ignored him and tried to do things quickly. I did not want to take the time to do them well. I had a party to go to, a gig to play,

or any other immature excuse. I was frequently bitten for thinking this way. I learned that if you did not take the time to do things right, somehow you could always find the time to do them over again. After I started my career, I discovered that folks do not take kindly to being charged again. They get quite testy about it. You learn fast.

Getting charged again would frost me too. On one hand, if they had given you a choice to replace the widget while the thing was apart, you would have said "yes of course, it only makes sense." After all, you love your car and you can afford a Porsche, so why didn't they?

My theory is that the person working on the car did not know you. He did not know how you felt about the car or how much you loved it. Your advisor may not have been familiar with the car or the potential problems that could crop up later. In fact, that guy might have already moved on to another place. It sounds like there was a disconnect...a breakdown of communication.

I sympathize with your frustration. You did not deserve it and even though I was not involved in the decisions, the result is obviously unsatisfactory. You deserved better and I wish I had been there to advise you. MC

Q – I am itching to drive my car and I went out to start it, the battery was dead. I know you covered it last year but please just explain it briefly. –Dave

A – Simple.

- 1) Don't jump start the car and expect the alternator to charge it, the alternator may FRY. When an alternator is trying to charge a dead battery it's running at 100 percent duty cycle—it is not meant to run at 100 percent.
- 2) Charge the battery with jumper cables connected another car for about 15 minutes.
- 3) After you have some voltage in the battery, don't try to start it immediately. Put it



on a slow 10- to 15-amp charge overnight (at least) to build up the battery.

- 4) Then start it and let it warm up. This is a good time for you check the tire pressures or fill the washer reservoir.
- 5) Air up the tires, take it out and have a ball. MC

Q – I am thinking of taking my car to the track and I want to learn more about it. I am not sure if my car is ready for it or if I am ready for it. –Steve

A – You are in good company. At the last "Intro to D.E." (driver's education) tech session, these topics were amply covered by my rabid motorhead friends in the club. Don't fret, there is more fun to come.

In March and April, you can learn more about what it is like to wring every last pony out of that flat six. Come over to Gilson Motorsports in March to learn the differences between "track" cars and daily driven cars that are taken to D.E. If your appetite has been sufficiently whetted, bring your car to Munk's Motors for the next D.E. Tech Inspection day where your car will be inspected to determine if it is suitable to take to a D.E.

If you are still uncertain, take a holiday and come out to the track to see just what goes on and get a ride with an instructor. It that doesn't scare you and if you think you are ready to learn how to drive your car the way it was intended, sign up and join the party. –MC

Q – My '86 Porsche 930 Turbo has been the joy in my life and a curse. I love it but I am freezing. I took it in three times complaining of lack of heat but got nothing except warm feelings. The problem is the warm feelings only last until I get to the end of the driveway then I freeze again. Help. –Ron

A – These older heating systems are tricky, but analyzing why you have no heat is simple. You have two heater control boxes attached to the body on either side of the transmission. When you need heat, two cables attached to the electronic heater control module between the seats, open the valves, turn on the fans and voila, you get heat. What could be simpler? Certainly not this system.

The most common failure is the linkage coupling, which is a sub-component of the module. It is cheap and so easy that I am sure the other shop has already looked at it. Since Porsche was trying to make the system sophisticated they added a sample motor to monitor the cabin temperature, heat sensors at the control boxes to monitor the heat temperature, a circuit board to sort it all out and a servo motor to convert the input into output. Oh, and I should mention the numerous fans that distribute or boost the flow

The time consuming part is figuring out which component or component(s) have failed. For that, I use a test car (borrowed with permission, of course) to compare inputs and outputs which are poorly documented in the service manual. Then (again with permission) I swap components out. Why not just replace what you think is wrong? The parts cost alone can top \$2,000 for genuine Porsche parts if you simply fire the "parts cannon" at it. So one must proceed cautiously when spending some one else's money.

I am certain that if you take this approach, you will have heat again, fall in love with your "beast" and take it out on cold November days without frosted toes. –MC

Proposed agenda for the Apr 13th 2021 meeting was sent via e-mail ahead of the meeting

Meeting Minutes of Mar 10th, 2021 were previously approved online.

Membership – Ken reported that the current membership is 144 primary, 71 affiliate members with 8 Junior members.

From the Editor

The past "Pandemic Year" has produced some strange and unparalleled circumstances. But people in the so-called aspirational class obviously have money to spend. According to the *New York Times*, every luxury acquisition has now become an alternative asset. Better be prepared to pay three times the already hefty retail price on the secondary market. A 1952 Mickey Mantle baseball card sold recently for \$5.2 million. A pair of autographed 1985 Air Jordan sneakers fetched \$275 thousand. And cars! New luxury brand Bentleys, Lamborghinis, and Bugattis are flying off the showroom floor. Vintage car prices also are climbing rapidly. A 1973 Porsche 911 Carrera RS, a holy grail of auto collectors, recently changed hands after the new owner plunked down \$1.2 million, double the pre-pandemic going price.

Not all of us want nor can afford a Carrera RS. I would not want to own a car that I would live in constant fear of some clown rear-ending or side swiping. Track it, as it was intended? At that price...maybe not. But as an investment, definitely worth considering. If you hanker for a vintage Porsche, there are loads of clean, attractive, and drivable cars out there that will not cost you the family fortune. With prices creeping upwards, you should probably act soon. A few examples. A 1973 911 E or T, the low-end cousins of the RS, can be had for under \$100 grand. Nice 964s or 993s, the last iterations of the air-cooled Porsches, are available for under \$50 thousand. At the low end, a drivable 914, 924, or 944 can be had for less than \$10 grand. Who would not get a kick out of owning any of those? As always, when buying a used Porsche, especially an old one, it is essential to have the car inspected by a knowledgeable mechanic to check for gremlins before writing a check.

I don't want to sound elitist. Some folks are struggling to feed their families and maintain mortgage payments, much less buying a vintage car. Let's not forget about them. When you obtain the car of your dreams, maybe offer to take some kid or a car guy who is strapped for funds for a ride. I have done it and they loved the experience. **Maybe our club needs to offer an event where we do just that**. Recall the PCA motto: "It's not just the cars, it's the people." Something we should always keep in mind.
