

Many events are over-subscribed as the demand to get our




Porsches out and be together is strong. I know that all are taking local precautions, and it's so great to see one another again.



Why I Bought My New Porsche; a Tribute to Pad

On a weekend this May I upgraded my 2006 Cayman S and picked up a 2016 981 Cayman GT4. I had been looking for months and recently the market changed quite a bit. All cars had been moving and prices were increasing slightly. I decided to pull the trigger and picked up the GT4 at United Auto Exchange in Chicago.

There is a long back story that comes with me being pulled to Porsche. My father, who passed away over a year ago from cancer, got me on the Porsche track. He told me the story after getting out of the Navy in the mid 60's when he went to a VW/Porsche dealership in Virginia. He almost bought a brand-new Porsche, but decided the price at the time was a little high for him. So he drove off the lot instead with a brand new VW beetle with options like a heater! After telling me the story, it switched my focus to looking at purchasing a Porsche. Prior to that, I was always an American muscle car guy. I had owned a newer Challenger R/T and really enjoyed the car.

My first purchase of Porsche was a 987.1 Cayman S. I was instantly impressed with how the car handled and it had all the power I really needed...I instantly became a Porsche guy! I admit, I do have a need for speed, too! The Cayman handled better and was faster than the Challenger.

In autumn of 2020 I signed up for the Rennsport Dragon Rally with over 200 Porsches driving that weekend. I opted for the spirited group, and was it spirited! We started at 9 am on the Dragon and there was no getting used to it. It was full throttle and pushing the Cayman S to the max around 318 switchbacks in 11 miles. After the Dragon, my fiancé and I caught our breath as we watched another Porsche in front of us pull over and let a car-sick passenger out to chuck it up. It was insanely intense but such a blast. Sure, I could have pulled off and taken it down a notch, but come on! After three days of mountain driving and well over 1,200 miles, I was convinced that I will always be a Porsche guy. The 987.1 was pushed to the car's limit, and mine really, but it handled everything without a problem. Regular maintenance and attention to fluids, however, is a must for that driving style.

Since that weekend, I have been cruising the web for a 981 GT4. I am a purest in that I want the manual gearbox and the naturally aspirated flat 6. Thanks to my father for giving me the work ethic to allow me to enjoy this lifestyle. By God's grace I am able to enjoy my passion for cars and now enjoy a GT4. So this one's for you Dad!





The last few autocross events that Motor-Stadt organized at Corrigan Oil Speedway were favored with great weather and a dry track. The latest one on Saturday, May 22 was no exception. The day began cloudy. But after lunch the sun broke through and the temperature climbed to the mid-80s, perfect weather for good run times. The turnout of cars was exceptional, with 11 Porsches running—911s (including James Topper's air-cooled), Caymans, Boxsters, and even a Macan SUV! All together over 25 cars of multiple makes came to run. Again, the MSU Racing Club was well represented. Board members Ken Jones, Terrill Whitney, James Yen, Joe Lavender, Steve Lee, and myself were in attendance, and all ran in their Porsches except Ken, who was the official starter. Most drivers in attendance pitched in and did what was necessary to keep the event running smoothly.

As a long-time participant in autocrosses at Corrigan, I've observed that drivers tend to segregate into three groups: the fast drivers with run times of 39-40 seconds; an intermediate group with times in the 41-44 second range, and a third group at 45 seconds and above. On the 22nd the "fast guys" were Conan Dombrowski (911), Matt MacFadden (911-Corvette), Rob Allie (Cayman S), and Loren Thomas (Mazda Miata). Matt's 996 911, with the flat six replaced with a Chevy V8, was very entertaining to watch, as well as the loudest car on the track. Loren's highly modified Miata, which he trailed in, navigated the corners as nimbly as any car I have seen run at Corrigan. Nicholas Rood photographed the event during the morning and caught all the cars in action.

Run times were almost secondary for some of us, although we were always interested to see what they were. We were mainly out there to have fun with our cars. And we did have fun!



Summer's finally here

Ask the MASTER CYLINDER

He's Chris Braden, head of **Munks Motors** in Waterford. These questions are real, and Chris, whose knowledge of Porsches is encyclopedic, takes them on.*

Q - When I started driving my Carrera this year, I noticed a puddle of oil under it that I thought had been fixed when I had my car in at the shop last winter. I am really ticked off since I paid good money and I expected the leak to be fixed. I am thinking that the shop was just incompetent, and I wonder who you would recommend. Bill

A - Oil leaks on older Carreras can make you crazy. The fact is, a leak that you fixed last year might not even be the same leak you are seeing this year. Gravity leads most oil to the lowest point of the engine and this can fool you. We technicians have documented over one hundred potential leak sources on Carreras and I have seen most of them. Air cooled engines tend to mark their spot.

But even so, if you had a place that you trusted repair a leak, the logical approach is to take it back and have them recheck their work. You should expect them to do this cheerfully and at no charge. As far as competence, don't be so quick to judge. Give them the benefit of the doubt and assume that they will demonstrate good will. All of my colleagues take their craft and their reputation personally. If you are disappointed, they want you to bring it back to give them a chance to make it right. If it is the same leak that they already fixed, they will correct the problem at no charge, and as a courtesy, if they diagnose another leak, odds are they will waive the inspection fee. A healthy business with satisfied clients practices the Golden Rule.

As far as the competence question, freshly minted Porsche techs occasionally know very little about older cars. Porsche has a new "virtual training option" to help newer techs learn about older cars. What makes it difficult is to replicate experience virtually. For that you need "the old guy".

For the best result, oil leak diagnosis should be done in four phases. First a seasoned professional should inspect the car and determine the degree of leakage and general location. Second, the apprentice tech will wash the leaky area(s) and add leak detection dve. Third, the car needs to be test driven to full warm up and inspected again by the senior technician. Many times, easy to spot leaks are addressed first leaving the more subtle leaks undetected. If a consistent, dogmatic diagnosis is not done, you can miss things. And finally, after resealing, the last phase of the diagnosis is the re-inspection after another long road test. (I always like those long road tests!). Now bear in mind, when you think you have fixed them all, more may crop up and sometimes worse than before. It is the nature of the beast.

On the later Carrera 2 & 4 and 993, the odor of hot oil and the loss of oil may seem merely annoying. Clients are often surprised to find their under-engine sound tray saturated with oil. The phrase "I never saw it on the garage floor" is a comment that I hear frequently. In this instance, the sound tray will catch and hold the oil. This is sort of like the baking tray but with foam insulation so even more oil can collect. This is not a good scenario when that oil saturated foam sits so close to the hot exhaust.

Some Porsche oil leak issues are extremely expensive to resolve. This was recently the case with an 86 Turbo which was occasionally driven and leaked about a quart every month. It was leaking from the crankcase seam, all over the concrete driveway. A strategically mounted baking tray from Gordon Foods solved the Issue of the driveway mess and adding oil regularly prevented the engine from running out of oil. Now admit, does that not sound like a cheesy solution? (that's why there are disclaimers).

Your vintage car might be just dandy with a few quirks and some annoying habits but in the final analysis, the cost of oil versus the price to reseal the engine may convince you that "the cure is worse than the disease". As far as "who to recommend" check reviews and pick a place that the web thinks is good

Q - My 89 930 Turbo has been giving me fits. The car will run great most of the time but occasionally, after I have been on the road for a while, is stumbles and makes a gurgling sound when I want to pass someone and "give it the boot". The only thing that looks amiss is the ignition coil that has oil oozing out of it. The problem is, whenever I take it in to have it checked out, it runs fine! - Dr. John

A - Naturally when your car suffers power loss or makes odd sounds, your best hope is that you will have an experienced technician with you during the test drive to experience the problem. Otherwise, just revving the engine up in the shop, you will probably never experience the failure.

There are some good tests that one should always consider. These are the basics and they include: Compression, cranking rhythm, fuel quality, fuel pressure and good clean power to the ignition system. These things can all be tested statically: i.e. without loading or driving the car.

The biggest problem these days on your generation car is that there are no self-diagnostics to give you a clue about where to look for the problem. But since it happens when the car is fully warmed up and under heavy load, we have a clue and that clue is the oil leaking out of the coil.

My experience has been that leaking oil filled coils can't be trusted. A healthy coil simply

does not leak. The tricky part about coil diagnosis is that they are an "on demand" device. If you test for spark by cranking the car over and holding the coil wire away from ground, (1/8 to ½") you will probably see a fat blue spark (if the car came in running). This can mislead you into trusting the coil since the output of the coil can't easily be tested under load. So as a diagnostic hunch, considering the price of a coil, and the oil leaking out, try it and at least it will no longer drip onto the engine

P.S. The coil fixed it. MC

From the Editor

I recently read an opinion piece on the electrification of cars and other vehicles. The author was not enthusiastic about the rush to electrification, largely based on a recent statement by Toyoda that warned that the world is not ready to support a fully electric fleet. I agree. I get the impression that most people think that electrification is a kind of free lunch. By moving away from polluting internal combustion engines we will advance into the environmentally friendly world of the kilowatt. I am not saying that electrification is a bad idea; what I am saying is that electrifying the fleet comes with environmental costs and problems of its own. These issues are not widely recognized or discussed during the mad rush to electrification.

Let's not even get into the short-term and long-term problem of recharging. In most population centers the all-electric car driver can usually find a high-speed charging station. In remote areas, such as the northern Michigan counties, good luck. The recharging infrastructure will build slowly, especially in rural areas, and may not keep pace with the sale of all-electric cars. Will the existing grid be able to accommodate a large-scale, high-speed recharging network? I doubt it. Building more power plants to meet this demand does not strike me as environmentally friendly.

Another serious problem with electrification is lithium-ion batteries. These batteries do not last forever. Sooner or later they will have to replaced, and the cost—both monetarily and environmentally—will be high. The disposal of large used L-I auto batteries is very problematic. These batteries contain rare and nasty chemicals—neodymium, lanthanum, terbium, and dysprosium, and critical metals such as lithium and cobalt—which our waste disposal system cannot currently recycle. Many of these rare-earth elements are not mined in North America. Rather, many of them are found in China or developing countries where environmental regulations are lax or lacking altogether.

All these problems must be accounted for in a balance sheet against the benefits electric vehicles bring to air quality and the environmental issues associated with the extraction of petroleum. We don't get anything for nothing! GM has announced that it will phase out all gas internal combustion engines by 2035. Other manufacturers, have followed suit. Porsche AG is well into conversion of its fleet to electrification. We already have the Taycan and the hybrid Cayenne and Panamera. Rumors are that the Cayman and Boxster will be fully electrified in this decade. Will this head-long plunge into a relatively new technology proceed unabated or will there be some backing away? We will just have to wait and see.
